Exhibit Guidelines

- 1. Single photographs $(31/2" \times 5", 4"$ \times 6", or 5" \times 7" prints) must be mounted on an 8" x 10" backing without frames or glass, with a caption.
- 2. Sets of 2 or 3 photographs (31/2" x 5" or 4" x 6" prints) must be mounted on an 11" x 14" backing without frames or glass, with a caption for each photo.
- 3. Sets of 4 or 5 photographs (31/2" x 5" or 4" x 6" prints) must be mounted on a 14" x 22" backing without frames or glass, with a caption for each photo.
- 4. Backing needs to be sturdy enough to support photo and travel well.
- 1. Set of 2 Portraits (two photos of the same person one using landscape and one using portrait position)
- 2. Set of 2 Shadow Photos (one with item casting shadow, one of shadow only)
- 3. Trick photo
- 4. Same subject taken with front, back, side and top lighting (4 photos)
- 5. Set of Birds Eye View and Bugs Eye View Photos (2 photos)
- 6. Black & White Photo
- 7. Flash Photo
- 8. Selfie Photo
- 9.Photo with Completed Scorecard
