




4-H Cross Stitch I & Advanced — Greentop

400.C-6 (R-18)













This project introduces members to the basics of cross stitch including equipment, materials, steps, and stitches. Members follow this guide to complete **Cross Stitch I, II, and III**.

In this project, you will learn:

Level I

- Correct use of equipment needles, hoop, thimble, and embroidery seisors
- To read instructions and work a stamped (transfer) cross stitch design.
- To use thread correctly how to separate and recombine threads, length of use, how to start and end stitches.
- How to use an embroidery transfer pattern to stamp a design for a cross stitch project.
- How to finish project in an appropriate manner.

Level II

- Appropriateness of even weave fabrics for a counted cross stitch project.
- Appropriateness of thread for cross stitch on even weave fabrics.
- How to read a counted cross stitch chart.
- A variety of ways to finish and display a counted cross stitch project.

Level III

- How to make a chart from a picture or an original design.
- How to work a cross stitch design on a plain weave or knitted fabric using waste canvas.
- How to do Assisi work. In this, the background is done in cross stitches and the design is left blank.
- How to use a cross stitch project as a picture how to back, mat and frame a cross stitch project correctly.
