







4-H Senior Clothing Construction Intermediate - Greentop

The Senior Clothing Construction project is divided into two project levels: Intermediate and Advanced. The intermediate level includes constructing garments which require less construction knowledge and skill refinement than the advanced level.

Project Objectives:

Once finished with the project, the member will be able to:

- Coordinate a wardrobe for themselves or others.
- Select quality fabrics and use those specific fabrics in making a garment.
- Complete a personal body analysis.
- Select patterns appropriate for option and personal physical characteristics.
- Select fabrics which are compatible with patterns chosen.
- Write quality commentaries.
- Learn to accessorize your everyday garments.

Project Activities:

Throughout this book you will review pattern characteristics, take an inventory of your sewing skills, learn about fabric characteristics, set goals to improve and try new techniques. Upon learning these new skills you can use a body analysis chart to select the best pattern for yourself or others. Because fabric is an important part of the design of a garment, you will examine different types and styles of fabrics.

Project Requirements:

Work with your leader, parent, 4-H or home economics agents to select the project best suited for your skill level and needs.
